DIRECTIONS TO THOMAS JEFFERSON UNITARIAN CHURCH

Directions to TJUC (4936 Brownsboro Road), site of the MARCH meeting (and beyond):

From the west or east: Take I-71 to the Watterson Expressway. Get in the right lane. Take exit 22, get in the second lane from the left, and turn left (east) onto Rt. 42 toward Rt. 22. Cross over the Watterson and turn right at the gas station on the next corner onto Rt. 22 (Brownsboro Road). Pass Crossgate Lane and take the very next right across from Holiday Manor Shopping Center toward Rodes and Brownsboro Dermatology. Go past that building and proceed to the church. Park

on the right side of the church, and go to the doors on the right end of the building.

From the south: Take the Watterson to exit 22, and turn right directly onto Rt. 22. Pass South Central Bank and Crossgate Lane, and take the very next right toward Rodes, then see above.

From Lyndon: Take Herr Lane north, pass

Ballard High, and take a left at the next light (Brownsboro Road). Pass McDonald's, look for Rodes and take the first left toward that building, then check above.

The church is set back and hard to see at night. A daylight dry run is recommended.

FUN WITH PHOTOSHOP: ORBS!

Here is an easy way to have a little fun in Photoshop:

Choose a photo with a sharp image that has different colors. Flowers work well.

Open image in Photoshop. Make sure it is only one layer. Crop photo into a square.

Choose Filter > Distort > Polar Coordinates > Polar to Rectangle.

Choose Image > Rotate > Flip Vertical

Choose Filter > Distort > Polar Coordinates > Rectangular to Polar.

HUTCHINSON TALK FEB. 7

The Paul Paletti Gallery's monthly talk will be this Friday, Feb. 7 at 7:30 p.m. and given by Andrea Hutchinson, a classically trained and self-taught artist who has been practicing creative photography for over a decade. She has been working at the Voice-Tribune for almost two years, creating fashion and editorial photo spreads for the magazine's glossy pages each month. Otherwise she probably can be found composing some whimsical outdoor scene or




hosting a collaborative photo shoot in her garage. Andrea's approach is about finding the sweet spot between calculation and unpredictability while balancing work life with the natural creative ebbs and flows that all artists feel. The Paul Paletti Gallery is located at 713 E. Market Street. Admission is free.

BILL PUSZTAI SHOW

The Louisville Photo Biennial folks recommend that you check out the exhibit by Canadian photographer Bill Pusztai, titled "Downtown East Side," that opens this Friday, Feb. 7 at the garner narrative gallery at 642 E. Market. Pusztai, who has exhibited in past Biennials, takes viewers on an intimate guided tour of his city, Vancouver, B.C., and it's both different and intensely familiar. "One tends to think of social issues as local," he says, "but many of these will resonate with people from any large enough city in North America." His bio is at http:// www.billpusztai.com/about/. The exhibit will run through March 28. Gallery hours are 11am-9pm on First Fridays, 1-6pm Wed-Thu, 11am-6pm Sat-other Fridays, and 11am-5pm Sundays.

LPS THROUGH HISTORY: 1942-44

After a successful first year as the Louisville Movie Club, but with only 23 memberships (and about 40 total people), it was decided to reach out to still photographers as a way to grow. So President Harold Rhodenbaugh sent letters and postcards to regional camera clubs, about 150 in all, to promote a "getacquainted party" scheduled for Feb. 9, 1942 in the Seelbach's Rathskeller and Plantation Club. program included an illustrated lecture on color film and then free rein to shoot anything — with floodlights and flash bulbs provided — at the nightclub performances that night.

It was a big success, and another jamboree was held in early June. That year the club also produced a critically praised 16mm color film of defense preparations by the city of Louisville. By late fall though, Rhodenbaugh was called into the military, and another movie buff, businessman/engineer Frank Richterkessing, took over. After another year, the club decided it could broaden its programs and make a name for itself by becoming a photography club and then conducting a "salon," an international competition in which photos were judged in order to be placed in a local week-long exhibition in a given city. In the 1940s there were hundreds of these across the country and around the world, and Louisville wanted a piece of the action. So the LMC became LPS, and plans were made to conduct the first Louisville salon in June 1944. (To be continued.)

This month in LPS history

75 years ago: The treasurer reported that LPS gained 12 memberships (to 47) and 19 people (to 81) in 1944, and turned a profit of \$152.70, helped by \$275 in dues and only \$146 in general expenses. ... Andrew Thome had two photos and J.E. Payton one in the "Scenic South" publication of Standard Oil of Kentucky.

40 years ago: The Feb. 15 banquet at the Breckinridge Inn (\$5) featured a program on "Photography and the News" by Marvin Meyerhoffer of WLKY-32. ... The Natural History Museum has offered a show of Ohio River Scenes to LPS photographers that will display 45 images for six months.

25 years ago: Meeting was a seminar night including presentations from LPS sponsors, on tabletop photography, 4x5 view cameras, a manager from 1 Hour Moto Photo on how to get good pictures from your lab, and a members' show and tell. **20 years ago:** 15 members are needed by the March of Dimes to photograph their fundraising event, "Walk America," on April 8 at 7:45 am at Bowman Field. (LPS involvement in this event dates back at least to the early 1980s.) ... Mary Krider is looking for volunteers to photograph the Ursuline School of Music and Drama's dress rehearsal of Jesus Christ Superstar on Feb. 22. Bring at least one roll of high-speed (ISO 800-1600) color print film and donate 8-10 prints, at least one 8x10.

10 years ago: Remember to bring your empty HP ink cartridges to the meeting. LPS receives a \$3 credit from Office Depot for each cartridge, which pays for the printing of our newsletter.

Five years ago: The first meeting at ARGI Financial.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than 6 entries may be submitted, with no more than 2 entries in each group. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
