FACEBOOK: CREATE A MEMBERS-ONLY GROUP?

Ken Tripp has proposed that **LPS start a closed members-only Facebook group.** LPS already hosts a public group (with more than 3,700 members), but his thought is that a closed group would permit discussion of paid LPS member issues, events and interests and be another easy way to facilitate contact between all of us.

Though about 75 percent of paid LPS members belong to the public group, it's thought a closed group would be more beneficial to the club. Those not in Facebook would still get necessary LPS info via the newsletter and periodic emails.

Administrators would strictly control admission to the closed group, but both groups would continue to function as the public group serves a wider audience with a lot of good information and both provides a valuable public service and is good publicity for LPS.

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PHOTO TIPS FOR THE PANDEMIC

Though photo tours and workshops in person have all been cancelled for now, there are still lots of ways to work on your photography.

The Photography Talk site lists their best books of the year at https://www.photography-books-2020. Besides instructional books for Photoshop, Photoshop Elements and Lightroom, among singled out at reasonable prices are Understanding Exposure and Learning to See Creatively, both by Bryan Peterson, Extraordinary Everyday Photography by Brenda Tharp (for creative projects you can do from home) and Criticizing Photographs by Terry Barrett (to learn the art of interpreting and evaluating).

Other pandemic-related photo news: Nikon USA has made its entire Nikon School Online curriculum free for the month of April. There are 10 classes ranging from 15 minutes to over an hour, all taught by professionals and usually cost between

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LPS HISTORY: THE FIRST DERBY TELECAST (ALMOST)

Some of you may know that the Kentucky Derby was first televised in 1949, by WAVE-TV in Louisville. It was aired live in Louisville and sent to NBC as a kinescope newsreel recording for national broadcast. But that wasn't the first planned Derby telecast, which was to be done by LPS in 1946!

LPS President Frank Richterkessing had been thinking about trying to film a Derby for a few years, and sold CBS television director John Sewall on the idea. The plan was for Sewall to come out the day before the race with a New York male actor to handle the voice-over and a model from the renowned Powers agency to display the fashions. On race day, three other LPS members, Eddie Raible, Carl Finger and Vernon Fields, were to be placed strategically around the track to film the Derby.

Richterkessing would shoot the stretch from atop the clubhouse with two cameras mounted side by side on a tripod "just in case one of them goes bad," he told the *Louisville Times*.

The resulting film would be rushed to New York by chartered plane immediately after the race, where it would be processed and televised at 6 p.m. Sunday by WCBW, the CBS station in New York. It wouldn't be seen in Louisville because the city didn't have a station yet.

But it never happened. Early in Derby week the newsreel and photo-finish cameramen got wind of the arrangement, made without their consent, and threatened to strike and boycott the Derby if CBS filmed it. Churchill Downs had no choice but to acquiesce, and Richterkessing's plan came to naught.


Three years later it was worked out for WAVE to show the race, and finally in 1952 CBS got to show the Derby live on a national telecast originated by WHAS-TV.

This month in LPS history

76 years ago: The LPS board voted to extend complimentary memberships for the duration of the war to all members of at least one year now serving in the armed forces.

75 years ago: Program consisted of a 16mm Kodachrome movie made for the Louisville Smoke Abatement Committee; 8mm movies made by Cpl. Maurice Fletcher while overseas in Italy and Tunisia; and exhibition and discussion of the print assignment topic "Rain."

30 years ago: Category was Churches/Stained

Glass Windows. Program (untitled) by Billy Davis. ... Irene Hendershot won an International contest. She tied for 1st Place Color for December, and then won 1st Place Color for the year; over 100,000 photos were entered from 125 countries.

25 years ago: Category was Night Shots. Program was "Photographic Flowers" by the Courier-Journal's Pam Spaulding. ... LPS is sponsoring a State Fair category just for junior high and high school kids. We will offer cash prizes and the Fair Board will provide ribbons. Ron Lehocky and others are working out the details with the Fair Board (this was the first year of the Junior Division: GB).

15 years ago: Category was Winter. Louisville Astronomical Society chairman Don Tabbutt presented a program of astrophotography. ... Mary Krider has two photo exhibits at A Little Peace Café at the Mellwood Arts Center, "Reminders of Fischer's," a tribute to their employees, and "Reminders of Butchertown."

10 years ago: Category was Yesterday. Gayle Moore and Tom Potter presented "The Challenge and Joy of Self-Publishing for Photographers." ... David Becker received a Nominee award for his photo "Elephant Patterns" in the Fine Arts category of the Spider Awards, the leading international awards for black and white and monochrome photography.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than 6 entries may be submitted, with no more than 2 entries in each group. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
