### **AUGUST SPEAKER: LUCY AZUBUIKE**

#### Wednesday, Aug. 12, 7:15 pm via Zoom

Wednesday night's Zoom speaker will be Lucy Azubuike, who is Bernheim Forest's 2020 Regional Artist in Residence. Azubuike, originally from Nigeria, works in sculpture, photography, painting, performance and video art, recognizing beautiful shapes and forms in nature as wholly complete works of art. Nature itself has created these works and they exist for us to enjoy, just as we enjoy art, which we see on display in museums and elsewhere. Azubuike, who has had several solo and group exhibitions and who has taught a workshop



and spoken on nature photography at the Josephine Sculpture Park in Frankfort, strives to highlight the beauty of these forms and accentuate the similarities and connections that exist between them and us, so that we can stop for a moment and pay attention to the environment and connect it to our personal lives. **(Watch your inbox Tuesday for the Zoom invite.)** 

### **COMPETITION CATEGORY EXPLANATION**

With the August contest, LPS competitions have returned to three categories: Color Print, Monochrome Print, Digital. But all entries are submitted digitally for now. The difference is that Color Print and Monochrome Print winners are to be printed out for year-end judging, and Digital entries will not be printed out but judged digitally at year's end. All entries MUST use the usual digital format rule of 1024px on the long side, 1 MB total file size and the naming convention shown on Page 2; digital competition files should start with "dig," i.e. digMo01-141516-0920-Photo) to the old address:



## LPS HISTORY: PHOTOGRAPHY AND THE STATE FAIR

Though the pandemic wiped out this year's contest, many members look forward to August and LPS' most visible volunteer effort — helping check in photos for the Kentucky State Fair and meeting hundreds of photographers from around the state and southern Indiana. This may seem as though it's been going on forever, but this LPS connection to the Fair dates back only to 1995, when the club sponsored and inaugurated the junior division for middle and high school students.

Dr. Ron Lehocky was the president then (Ron and Peg Lehocky still contribute the money the Fair pays to the junior winners, which was \$410 last year), and Lynn Shea was the first on-site coordinator. Even that first year, besides organizing the junior division, LPS members helped with the adult competition, measuring entries, making sure they met category criteria, collating the prints into classes and hanging about 800 of the 1,200 entries. That first contest was judged by photographers Suzanne Mitchell and John Nation and had 47 entrants in nature, people and unclassified (color) and nature and people (mono). Jennifer Wolford won color Best of Show and Emily Church won mono Best of Show.

The next year, Dee and Bob Armbruster donated an annual silver bowl to be presented to an overall Best of Show winner; the first was Renee Davis of Lexington, who won it again in 2000. Mitchell and

Nation judged again that year; other junior judges over the years have included Adam Jones, Danny Dempster, Luis Martens, Joey Goldsmith and Scott Henson (the current judge). Currently, LPS has two liaisons to the Fair — Deborah Brownstein for the junior contest and Carolyn Hawkins for the general

volunteer effort. The junior contest topped 100 entries in 1999; in recent years, there have been about 400 entries and about 300 actual prints/ digitals. In 2002, Dee Armbruster died and the silver bowl was renamed in her memory and presented three more years. Eventually, Best in Show became a \$50 prize named in memory of Terry Boice and in honor of Al Boice (and then in his memory after he died in 2017). However, that's not LPS' only connection with the Fair, which has included a photography competition since 1913. That year (and through World War II), photography was a division of arts and crafts in the women's section. The first winner was Bertha Scott of Midway, who swept the three categories – landscape views, aquatic views and animal life.

WWII did a number on the Fair. It was not held in 1942 or 1943 and moved to Churchill Downs for the next two years. Once it returned to its west Louisville fairgrounds (Cecil Avenue west of 38<sup>th</sup> Street), photography became a general competition open to both sexes. It got a boost in space and prize money once the Fair moved to its current site in 1956. The Fair also sponsored snapshot contests for best amateur photos at the Fair in at least 1941, 1959 and 1960. Several LPS members have been Fair judges; Menta DeLeuil did it the most, at least 10 years. The Vincent Hensley Memorial Award, given to the monochrome Best in Show, is named for a longtime LPS member (and toolmaker at GE Appliance Park), who also was a past president (1961) and died in 1980. The Hensley Award was announced in the fall of 1984 by his widow, Dorothy, who sadly never got to see it presented as she died early the following summer; Bob

Wells has won it the most times.

That wasn't the first monochrome Best in Show award though, as from 1962 until the early 1980s the Fair presented a trophy in memory of Cranston Ritchie, the Fair's first director of printing and photography, who created all sorts of promotional posters and artwork when he was hired in 1961. But Ritchie, just 38, died of cancer later that year.

And for those Fair volunteers who despair as to whether entrants will ever get the entry rules correct, in 1973 (with a then-record 250 entries), DeLeuil told the Courier-Journal she was impressed by the overall quality but was disturbed over how many good entries had to be disqualified because they were mounted improperly. "People should read the instructions," she said.













## ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. Because of the pandemic, all classes must be entered digitally for monthly competitions; print category winners are to be printed at year's end for the yearly competition. No more than 2 entries allowed per category. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- $\cdot$  You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
