SEPTEMBER SPEAKER: DICK WILSON

Wednesday, Sept. 9, 7:15 pm via Zoom

This month's speaker is Dick Wilson, a local serious photographer, philanthropist and collector who is also senior vice president and financial advisor at Morgan Stanley; his talk is entitled, "Pushing a Shutter and Not a Trigger," about his time taking "Hometown News Release" photographs of soldiers for the Army's Public Information Office while in Vietnam in the mid-1960s as a secretary for the battalion commander of the 223rd Aviation Battalion in Quin Nhon. He also visited air companies all over



the country, including Cam Ranh Bay, Da Nang, Hue Citadel, Phu Bai, Quang Tri and Nha Trang, among others, and met many of the celebrities who gave USO-sponsored shows there. After Vietnam, he spent more time as a battalion photographer in Germany before returning home. **(Watch your inbox Tuesday for the Zoom invite.)**

COMPETITION CATEGORY EXPLANATION

LPS competitions have returned to three categories: Color Print, Monochrome Print, Digital. But all entries are submitted digitally for now. The difference is that Color Print and Monochrome Print winners are to be printed out for year-end judging, and Digital entries will not be printed out but judged digitally at year's end. All entries MUST use the usual digital format rule of 1024px on the long side, 1 MB total file size and the naming convention shown on Page 2; digital competition files should start with "dig," i.e. digMoo1-141516-0920-Photo) to the old address:

LPS HISTORY: THE INTERNATIONAL SALONS (1945-58)

This month in LPS history

78 years ago: The Louisville Movie Club set up its outline for the film it would shoot for the Louisville Metropolitan Area Defense Council – 1,600 feet, divided into sections on Welfare, Health, Safety, Volunteer and Works, and including a staged incident to demonstrate the Council's responsibilities in case of attack (more on this in a future newsletter).

76 years ago: The meeting Sept. 21 in the Leather Room of the Seelbach Hotel drew 31 people to see Capt. Walter Wilson demonstrate his 4x5 camera made from odd parts and made to resemble a Speed Graphic; a film on Niagara Falls by J. Carl Finger; and a set of 35mm color slides taken by Carl Nachod on vacation in Atlantic City. Photo assignment was "Summer Sports" and drew 12 prints; the favorite was one by L.W. Kerr showing his daughter Patsy steering a sailboat. 40 years ago: Category was Member's Choice. Program was a nature slideshow by Hawes Fisher, who also won the blue ribbon in Portraits at the State Fair; Bob Dentinger (Natural History) won LPS' other blue ribbon. 35 years ago: Category was Scenics. Program was a Photographic Society of America slideshow, "Let's Make Better Landscape Pictures." ... Carolyn Voss won the Grand Prize in the Zoo Calendar contest; Gene Lester and Marge and Bob Dentinger also were winners.

30 years ago: Category was Member's Choice. Program was a slide show, "A Day of Nature in Kentuckiana," by Al and Terry Boice ... Bob Dentinger won the State Fair's Vincent Hensley Award for best black-and-white photo (animals); other club blue ribbons went to Ron Lehocky (color portrait) and Dentinger (b/w portrait); Lynn Shea was one of the Fair judges. 25 years ago: Category was Capturing People (Candid). Program was a slide show from renowned photographer Bill Thomas ... State Fair wrapup: Ron Lehocky won the

LPS has had photo exhibitions all over Louisville, and the Louisville Photo Biennial has been going strong for the past 20 years. But for 15 years, LPS hosted the top photographic event in Louisville — the Louisville International Salon of Photography. After an auspicious start in June 1944, displaying 160 images culled from the 519 submitted entries (see June newsletter), the goal was to make this one of the top annual salons in the country.


First the club decided to shift to the fall (less competition), and small ads were placed in national photography magazines and notices run in camera club newsletters. The Courier-Journal Sunday magazine ran one or two features with show details and as many as a dozen submissions.

Entry numbers the next two years dropped a little into the 400s, but with peace and prosperity came a boom in entries in 1947, to more than 800, from more than two dozen states and several foreign countries. That geographic spread would hold throughout. The Watterson Hotel hosted the first four salons. In 1948, color slides were added (628 entries the first year) and the exhibition moved to the Speed Art Museum. The next year, WAVE-TV, on the air less than a year, broadcast a preview of the event, with photographer Fred Peel hosting.

Because of the difficulty of putting the show together in late summer, the club soon after decided to move back from fall to

spring, skipping 1950. It didn't hurt. The 1951 show drew nearly 800 monochrome print entries and nearly 800 color slides; 200 prints and 225 slides made the cut for the exhibition. Judging throughout was done by electrical pushbutton boxes; each judge flicked one of three switches (green, yellow or red, meaning yes, hold for review and no) that were linked to a central box where the results were recorded; it often took a few passes to cull down the entries.

Prints could be color or monochrome starting in 1952; 1953 was the first year that color photo supplies outsold monochrome. Movies were added in 1955, and the title was changed from "Salon" to "Exhibition." The show program went to slicker paper with a photo on the front and drew national and local advertisers. But the entry fee never rose above \$2 for four prints, \$1.25 for four slides or \$2-6 for a movie. The top movie received a trophy and the top couple of photos and slides received certificates of merit, but there were no other awards. And the club paid return postage on all entries.

A recurring problem was finding a space big enough to host the print exhibition; slides and movies were projected a couple of nights each at an auditorium. In 1953, the club lost the use of the Speed Museum but found a substitute at Refrigeration Sales Company on Brook Street. Starting in 1954, the Courier-Journal displayed print winners in its lobby but couldn't in 1957, so the club dropped the category for that one year. The most prints, 938, were received in 1954; the most slides, 1,567, in 1958, the last year of the exhibition. It was suspended for 1959 when the Photographic Society of America convention came to town but never resumed.

That last year also featured the salon's most national exposure (so to speak): One of the prints, a nude, was stolen from the Courier-Journal lobby; dozens of newspapers around the country printed the Associated Press story. "Please bring it back," a spokesman begged. "No questions will be asked."

Hensley Award (b/w animals); Sandy Nabb won color Best of Show (animals); other club blue ribbons went to David Rosenberg (color scenic), Hawes Fisher (color floral) and Bob Wells (b/w floral). Jennifer Wolford won Best in Show in the first Junior Division contest. sponsored by LPS; there were 47 entrants, and judges were Suzanne Mitchell and John Nation. 20 years ago: Category was Windows, Portals & Doors, T.Y. Huang presented a slide show on his trip to Hawaii. ... State Fair wrapup: Bob Wells won five blue ribbons, including the Hensley Award (mono floral), best monochrome (scenic) and best color (human interest) with other firsts in mono unclassified and color floral: Gertrude Hudson won blue ribbons in mono human interest and color scenic; Renee Davis of Lexington won Junior Division Best of Show. 15 years ago: Category was Patterns. Oldham Era photographer/writer John Foster presented a program on shooting a county fair ... Bob Wells won a State Fair blue ribbon in monochrome digitals; Junior Division Best of Show went to Collegiate eighthgrader David Bloom. 10 years ago: Category was Sculptures or Statues. Lori Reeder presented a program on starting your own photo business ... State Fair blue ribbons went to Bob Wells (color nature), Steve Hamilton (color scenic) and T.Y. Huang (color parks); Aidan Tollefson won Junior Division Best of Show. Five years ago: Category was

Water's Edge. Program was from LPS President Nick Roberts on photographing the Ohio River Bridges Project ... This was the first meeting at ARGI Financial on High Wickham Place in eastern Jefferson County ... Christine Hayden won best monochrome photo in show and another blue ribbon (people, places) at the State Fair; other firsts went to Deborah Brownstein (mono things), Jim Ofacacek (sport) and George Sherrard (color things).



ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. Because of the pandemic, all classes must be entered digitally for monthly competitions; print category winners are to be printed at year's end for the yearly competition. No more than 2 entries allowed per category. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- \cdot You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
