NOVEMBER SPEAKER: DR. DAVID KEELING

Wednesday, Nov. 11, 7:15 pm via Zoom

This month's speaker is Western
Kentucky University cultural geography
professor David Keeling, who will
present a program on landscapes and
environments around the world that he
has photographed. In 40 years of travel,
Keeling has accumulated more than a
million images of about 2,000 locations.
At WKU, he teaches a class called
Visualizing Geography, which addresses
how people "see" people and landscapes



through imagery. Keeling has written many articles and books on Argentina, on Latin America generally, and on broader cultural and transport topics. He also will be the resident lecturer on a Paul Gauguin cruise next May to the Society Islands, Cook Islands, Tonga and Fiji. (Watch your inbox Tuesday for the Zoom invite.)

LPS HISTORY: MAZZONI'S NEWSREELS (1948-50s)

A big draw for LPS monthly meetings from 1948 well into the 1950s was the chance to be treated to a 12-minute color newsreel of goings on around town. The filmmaker was Ed Mazzoni (of Mazzoni's ovster house fame), who spent many hours each month shooting (with an assistant, member Eddie Daub) and then processing his 400-foot movie in his home darkroom. Among the typical subjects: Easter services in Iroquois Park, the Shrine parade, Louisville Colonels baseball opening night at Parkway Field, flood scenes in Frankfort, a dedication in Corydon, Ind. One month he used all 12 minutes to tell the story of St. James Catholic Church, and the church showed it for years after. Mazzoni, an original member of the Louisville Movie Club, had proposed the idea in 1948. LPS couldn't afford to finance it, but Mazzoni offered to foot the bill as long as he retained the film. So

Mazzoni's love for moviemaking started at age 25, soon after the birth of his first daughter, Joan, when he wandered into a photographic-supply shop and emerged with an 8mm Pathex movie camera. He went home, shot film of his daughter and sent it out. When it came back, he borrowed a projector, and results were almost perfect. "That sold me on home movies," he said. But soon his

8mm equipment was insufficient, and so was sending out film. So he bought a home processing kit for \$10 — one pan, one reel and a drying rack. That didn't work either as several chemicals had to be used. So then he bought five deeper tanks —

off he went.

76 years ago: The meeting Nov. 16 in the Leather Room of the Seelbach Hotel, attended by 27 members and 12 guests, featured a 16mm movie of Corpus Christi, Texas, made by Fr. R.M. Rascher and accompanied by recorded music. Also, six prints were submitted for the assignment, "Tabletops." Catherine Wiley's print was chosen best of the month.

75 years ago: The second Louisville International Salon of Photography was exhibited Nov. 12-17 at the Watterson Hotel. A total of 178 prints from 77 contributors were shown; entries totaled 422 prints from 109 entrants. Judges were E. Earl Curtis of Paducah, Jon Dalton Dodds of Benton and Paul Pratte of St. Louis. 60 years ago: Marge Griffin was the only Louisvillian to win a category in the Exhibition of Nature Photography. Her photograph of a lotus blossom in Cave Hill Cemetery won the botany class of the transparency group (see photo above next column).

40 years ago: Category was Close-Ups. Winners were Mark Needham (slides), George Laubheimer (b/w) and Hawes Fisher (color). ... Program was a slideshow titled

"Wildlife" by the aforementioned Marge Griffin.

35 years ago: Category was Children. Winners were Larry Morgan (slides and b/w) and Julian Sacksteder (color). The program was a 16mm movie from Kodak, "Southern Highlands — America's Pictureland."

30 years ago: Category was Boats. Winners were Ethel Stoke (slides) and Gertrude Hudson (color prints) ...

Ethel Stoke won the Courier-Journal photo contest with an image of her 7-year-old granddaughter and got her photo on the cover of the Sunday magazine (see above) ... 1991 categories: Patterns, A Different Angle, Close Ups, Light, Blowing in the Wind, Human Interest,

LPS HISTORY: MAZZONI'S NEWSREELS (1948-50s)

one per chemical — but had to discard them as the acid ate through the galvanized steel. So he had five stainless steel tanks built. They cost \$145 total (about \$1,550 today). He'd been winding the film through the chemicals by hand but soon motorized the process. It eventually took him about an hour to process three minutes of film. At LPS, often he'd run the projector, or his assistant — younger daughter Judy, who was just 9 when the newsreels started.

Mazzoni, who helped run the restaurant until his death in 1967 at age 66, never did commercial film work. Just for friends, family and LPS. "I've never sold a foot," he said, "but sometimes I give it away. I know that having movies of some important occasion — like a wedding — means a lot."

Member's Choice, Stop the Action, Feeling Good, Scenics & Landscapes.

25 years ago: Category was Scenics. Winners were Jake Drake (slides), David Rosenberg (color prints) and Bob Wells (b/w) ... Program was a retrospective of Courier-Journal images from recently retired Larry Spitzer.

20 years ago: Category was Markets. Winners were Greta Garbo (color prints), Bob Dorzback (b/w) and Terry Boice (slides).

15 years ago: Category was Scenic. Winners were Al Wollerton (color prints), Joe Schneid (b/w) and Greta Garbo (slides). Program was a slide show, "Canadian Tranquility," by Gertrude Hudson ... "Digital SLR's start at around \$1,000, but 'point-and-shoots' are dropping in price. Also, you won't need a computer to get pictures; you can review them in the camera and delete unsatisfactory ones, and review your 'memory card" in a kiosk at your local Walmart, Target or Kroger (or to Murphy's Camera) and before choosing what to print.

10 years ago: Category was National or State Parks, Winners were David Becker (digitals), Al Wollerton (color prints), John Holthaus (b/w) and Janice Hamilton (novice) ... Adam Jones presented a program of scenic and panoramic images from around the world, plus reptile macros. He also discussed how he shot his panoramas, HDR and macro images. ... Al Boice was recognized as Volunteer of the Year at the Episcopal Church Home. ... Beginning this month, print placewinners can choose to have their photos displayed in the Episcopal Church Home's main hall until the next meeting. Five years ago: Category was Sports. Winners were Kay Sherrard (digitals), Greg Miller (color prints), Robert Klein (b/w) and Andrew Winter (novice). Program was "Photography on the Go," from member Steve Cowherd, discussing beforeand-after photos, fine art acrylic photography and a slide show of his work.

ZOOM ETIQUETTE

As breaches of Zoom meeting etiquette have been in the news lately, here are a few tips from the experts on how to make yourself look good in front of your peers and a computer camera: § Act as you would if you were attending in person. Show others that you are listening with nonverbal cues like nodding or shaking your head, smiling, giving a thumbs up, etc. As you should mute yourself when not speaking, this is a good way to show support.

§ Don't multitask during a meeting. If your camera

is on, it will be apparent to others that you're not paying attention. If you have to break away for some reason, mute your video temporarily. If you have to eat a meal during the meeting, let everyone know — and maybe mute the camera.

§ Try to look into the camera (it gives the impression of eye contact), and light yourself with a lamp in front. Keep distracting items out of view. § Leave with a wave. If you have to leave early, find the first opportune moment, say you need to go and

wave goodbye.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. Because of the pandemic, all classes must be entered digitally for monthly competitions; print category winners are to be printed at year's end for the yearly competition. No more than 2 entries allowed per category. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
