HOW TO NAME AND SIZE CONTEST IMAGES

Errors will now be rejected, requiring correction

Because Kay Sherrard and John Holthaus say they are spending too much time fixing incorrect file names and sizes, those entering competitions starting in March **must name and size their entries properly or they will be rejected.**

You will receive an email that says either "Received, entries are OK" or "Entries Rejected." You will have until Friday to submit corrected ones.

File names must be in the following format:

 \diamond A for Advanced, M for Amateur

 \diamond Number of print (001-002 color, 003-004 mono, 005-006 digital; digitals must be preceded by Dig)

 \diamond Six-digit code corresponding to your initials (A=1, Z=26)

- \diamond Four-digit code corresponding to date (0321 is March 2021)
- Photo title
- \diamond All separated by hyphens

The size of the files cannot exceed 1 MB. (Note that files under 100K do not show well.)

BEATING THE WINTER BLAHS

Some winter bird photography tips from Ray Hennessey in *Living Bird* magazine, courtesy of Eileen Strenecky:

** Cold weather can quickly drain batteries, so bring extra and store them in an inside jacket pocket close to your body.

** Embrace the snow: Add positive exposure compensation to get your bird exposed correctly, especially if it is a dark bird. One benefit of snow is that it can act as a reflector, allowing you to shoot in stronger sunlight than without snow. But earlymorning and late-day sun are preferable to midday.

** **To show off falling snow,** seek out areas with a darker background. Also compensate with slower shutter speeds and higher ISOs. You can freeze falling snow at 1/500, but even at 1/100 or 1/250 snow will streak through the scene.

** Bring the birds to you with fresh water: Not all species eat seed and suet, but all birds need water, and a lot of their usual sources can freeze. It can be as simple as a standard birdbath with a heater.

This month in LPS history


60 years ago: Vincent Hensley (for whom the State Fair's best monochrome photo award is named) was elected president of LPS ... Vincent's wife, Dorothy, was named secretary. Also elected: William Sims, motion-picture vice president; Bland Garrett, stillpicture VP; Helen Garrett, assistant secretary. New directors are Edgar Daub, Heber Johnson, Joe Kinberger, Frank Richterkessing, Bill Clark, Arthur Frankhouser, Dale Weir and Marge Griffin. 55 years ago: Bill Clark was installed as LPS president at the annual banquet, held at the Medical Arts Building. Other officers: Bland Garrett, movies vice president; Theodore Haapla, stills VP; Menta DeLeuil, secretary-treasurer; Georgetta Knecht, assistant secretary. Ruby Lee Sims won the

F.J. Deleuil Memorial Community Award; year-end winners were Haapla (color slides), Zana Naake (black and white prints); Bill Rhodes (8mm movies) and William Sims (16mm movies).

40 years ago: Category was Patterns. Winners were Dick Clark (slides), John Ohminus (b/w and color prints) ... Program was "The Lion's Tale" by member Howard Fitch, a slideshow of lion monuments, statues and artifacts from around the world. ... Awards banquet (\$8.50 per person) was Feb. 14 at the Brownsboro Road Holiday Inn with WHAS photographer Keith Albert speaking on "Photography and the News." Year-end winners: Alan Shadburne (b/w points), Ethel Stoke (color print points), Bill Rhodes (color slide points and best color slide), Benita Niemann (b/w print), L.E. Sanborn (color print), Marge Griffin (Community Service Award) and Alfred & Terry Boice (slide show). 35 years ago: Category was Close-Ups. Winners were Larry Morgan (slides), Robert Guest (b/w) and Julien Sacksteder (color). Judge was Lee Anderson. Program was a

It was 80 years ago this month, on Feb. 5, 1941, that about two dozen motion-picture enthusiasts met at the Watterson Hotel to form the first all-color amateur moviemaking club in the United States. By the end of the year, the club had more than 30 memberships.

The next Feb. 9, the club sponsored a wildly successful photo jamboree at the Plantation nightclub inside the Seelbach Hotel, which drew about 275 (!) people. It didn't generate 275 members, nor did a follow-up that June. But by 1944,

when LMC became the Louisville Photographic Society, the new club had 35 memberships and began steady growth through the next decade to more than 100 memberships and stayed there for quite some time. LPS was here to stay.

But who were the founders and pioneers of LMC? It was quite a mixed bag.

The first president was Courier-Journal photo director and rotogravure editor Harold Rhodenbaugh, but when in May 1942, Rhodenbaugh became Capt. Rhodenbaugh of the Army Air Corps, and four months later moved to New York to work for *Look* magazine, the club needed a new leader.

Enter first vice-president Frank Richterkessing, who held the post for four years and took over a couple of times later, in 1954 and 1959. Frank and wife Betty (who was secretary for several years and kept a lot of the organizing

files) are most responsible for the framework that became LPS.

But there were many more people who made the Louisville Movie Club what it was in the early days, and here are some of their backgrounds on the following page. Many are significant figures in 1940s-era Louisville. (Some of their more detailed stories will be told in the coming year, too.)

Harold Rhodenbaugh

Chief photographer and then rotogravure editor of the C-J 1936-42 before joining Army Air Corps in May 1942 as a photographer; after four months went to work for Look magazine; career also took him to Life and Saturday Evening Post. Came to C-J from Washington Post, where he was picture editor. Married to Beth Rhodenbaugh, who at the time was the C-J's librarian.



Frank Richterkessing

Chairman of board of Cissell Mfg., at the time one of biggest dry-cleaning equipment manufacturers in the world; former president of the Gorsuch Foundry in Jeffersonville; patent attorney, inventor, past director of the Kosair Oriental Band; former past potentate of Kosair Shrine Temple; wife Betty was LMC/LPS secretary and club officer until her death in 1957.



J. Carl Finger

Master brewer of the Frank Fehr Brewing Company (Liberty & S. Jackson), once one of the top brewers in the Southeast and the top seller in the Louisville market in 1949; prosperous until sales steadily declined in the 1950s and the brewery closed in 1964.



G. Walter Hopkins

Known as "Hop," he was the dean of Louisville sports photographers, retiring in 1955. Worked in the photo dept, for the Sutcliffe Co., a general merchandise store at 225-227 S. Fourth. Photographed every Derby winner for 37 years and high school football dating to 1898.



Maxwell Allen

Former reporter for Louisville Times, also known as "Scoopy," became insurance fraud investigator and then private investigator (Maxwell Allen Investigating Bureau) well-known for being city's top handwriting expert: used infrared photography and other tools to detect forgeries: first editor of Radio-Grams, LMC's newsletter. He died in 1977 at age 68.



Catharine Wiley

Club secretary in 1945; assistant secretary 1946-early 50s; chairman of slides division of Louisville Salon 1949, 1951-55 before untimely passing in 1957; taught sixth grade for 35 years at John A. Strother Elementary.



Glenn Cook

Plant superintendent for American Building Supply Co., civil engineer and one of the heroes of the 1937 flood, using his amateur radio equipment to receive and broadcast messages to city officials, police, military and other agencies helping the city; he died in 1957 at age 52.



Nolte Ament

One of top certified gemologists in the country, owner of Geiger & Ament retail jewelers, 447 S. Fourth, which had one of few gemtesting labs in US.



Robert Muth

Co-owner (with brother Walter) of Muth Optical at 665 S. Fourth St. for 22 years; died of a heart attack at age 49 while driving to work.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two levels of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories at each level, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. Because of the pandemic, all classes must be entered digitally for monthly competitions; it's not clear yet whether 2021 print category winners will be judged digitally at year's end. No more than 2 entries allowed per category. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- \cdot You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
