light and a couple of white foam core bounce cards directed the light, and then the steps in Photoshop he used to process the image: "Although I will be working with a strobe, most of the things needed to make the images are inexpensive. ... I hope you find my presentation helpful with your still life shots."

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DUES TO INCREASE FOR 2022

Owing to rising expenses (competition awards, meeting room rental fees, equipment maintenance), the LPS board voted to raise dues starting with the 2022 calendar year. The new cost will be \$45 for the first family member and \$15 for each additional adult family member (including spouses). It's the first increase since 2010, when the \$35 rate was set. Louisville Movie Club/LPS dues started at \$5 in 1941, then gradually increased to \$10 (early 1970s), \$12 (1982), \$15 (1986), \$25 (1991, when the dues year moved from Sept-Aug to the calendar year) and \$30 (2002) before the 2010 raise. Room rental was a major driver of increases, but also competition awards and club equipment.

BOOK ENTRIES DUE NEXT MONTH

Entries will be due next month for the annual LPS Book of the Year competition. It will be possible to deliver books either to the November meeting or to a dropoff site to be announced later. Photos can be taken at any time (not just 2021) and images that previously won can be included in the book.

Bottles should include more than one bottle; A Pair of Things should include two matching or related items; Bokeh is the blurred quality or effect seen in the out-of-focus portion of a photograph taken with a narrow depth of field; Things in Motion should include some sort of motion blur, which is the purposeful streaking or blurring of an object in motion in a photo for visual effect; Uniforms must include at least one person. There are no clarifications/restrictions on any other category, except for a reminder that the topic of the category should be the main focus of the photograph.

NOTE: For December 2021, the **Trees/Leaves** category is meant to include trees or the leaves from a tree. Also, in December, members will vote via an internet platform for the winning images.




LOUISVILLE PHOTO BIENNIAL CONTINUES

The Louisville Photo Biennial continues through Nov. 14 with photo exhibitions at 53 venues in Kentucky and Southern Indiana. While LPS does not have its own show this time, current and former members have images in some, including the 12x12 Ivy Tech show in Sellersburg, which runs through Nov. 12. Also, Fred DiGiovanni has shows at Edenside (with a meet the artist on Oct. 16, 1-4 pm) and Wayside (reception Oct. 17, 2-4 pm), Danny Dempster at Mount St. Francis (presenting a workshop at the Mary Anderson Center Nov. 6. 9am-noon), and C.J. Pressma and John Nation at PYRO. Also the 21c hotel is offering a guided tour of its collection every Thursday from 5-6 pm and there are several workshops. LPS HISTORY: 75 YEARS AGO

In the 1940s, October was Salon month in Louisville. So in 1946, LPS staged the third Louisville International Salon of Photography, accepting 465 prints from 119 entrants, and a panel of three judges (Paul Pratte of St. Louis, Bernard Silberman of Cincinnati and Donald Jameson of Indianapolis) used LPS President Frank Richterkessing's electronic judging boxes to choose 205 that were exhibited Oct. 21-26 at the Watterson Hotel downtown. Two photos from that Salon are displayed at right. It was a busy month — there also was a club meeting Oct. 18 (a discussion of

creative movie titles and a print assignment, "Glass"). When the Salon ended, the club celebrated with a member's outing Oct. 27 that included lunch and bingo (and a \$3.06 profit for the club!).

40 years ago: Category was Weeds. Winners were Dick Clark (slides), Alan Shadburne (b/w prints) and B.G. Ash (color prints) ... Program was "The Nature Story," presented by the Kentucky Society of Natural History. Photoscenic Weekend was held Oct. 23-25 at Carter Cayes State Park.

35 years ago: Category was Wildflowers. Winners were Terry Boice (slides), J. Baxter (b/w prints) and Ethel Stoke (color prints); judge was Billy Davis ... Program was a slideshow from Glen Warren, "Nature Around the World," from the judging of international salon slides ... Photoscenic Weekend was Oct. 17-19 at Lake Barkley ... The October newsletter was Terry Boice's last as editor after a long run that had started in the 1970s.

30 years ago: Category was Stop the Action. Winners were L.C. McDowell (slides) and Ron Lehocky (color prints); there were no b/w awards; judges were Marcella Johnson and David Lutman ... The program was a slideshow from Trinnet Foote-Hemmer of images from Moscow's Red Square during the revolution ... Photoscenic Weekend was Oct. 18-19 at Lake Barkley, and Gertrude Hudson won the Grand Prize.

25 years ago: Category was Close-Ups. Winners were Jack Drake (slides) and Bob Wells (color and b/w prints); judges were David & Kate Davis ... Program was a slideshow from Glacier Park, Yellowstone and the Grand Tetons by Irene and Stuart Hendershot. ... Photoscenic Weekend was Oct. 11-13 at Natural Bridge State Park.

20 years ago: Categories were Action (postponed from the canceled meeting in September) and Summer in Louisville (October). Winners were T.Y. Huang (Action color and b/w prints), Fred Engelmann (Action and Summer slides), Bob Dorzback (Summer color prints) and Julia Albicocco (Summer b/w prints); the Action judge was Barry Westerman and the Summer judge John

Stines ... Louisville Bats/Courier-Journal freelancer Stan Denny presented a program on sports and action photography ... Photoscenic Weekend was Oct. 12-14 at Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park; T.Y. Huang won Close-Up and Best of Show, and John Smithers won Scenic.

15 years ago: Category was Floral. Winners were Fred Engelmann (slides), T.Y. Huang (b/w prints), Joe Schneid (color prints) and David Becker (digital); the program was live judging and commentary therein from Lynn Shea ... Members approved a by-law change restricting monthly entries to three per division and nine total ... Joe Schneid's photograph was named Editor's Choice by the Hummingbird Society; another photo took second place in the Kentucky Living magazine contest ... T.Y. Huang won the Faces category in the Courier-Journal Travel Photo contest; Bob Wells placed second in Places and Byron Butler took an honorable mention in Faces ... Photoscenic Weekend was Oct. 20-22 at Jenny Wiley State Park: winners were Marshall Johnson (best of show) and Greta Garbo (close-ups and scenic). 10 years ago: Category was Insects, Spiders and Butterflies. Winners were George Sherrard (digitals and monochrome prints), Deborah Brownstein (color prints) and Greg Miller (novice); judge was Al Schneider ... Deane Patton and Phil Wakeman presented a program of photographs from their humanitarian trips to Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua and El Salvador ... Gertrude Hudson won the Winter, Summer and Fall awards in the Four Seasons of Cave Hill calendar contest (and placements in the calendar).

Five years ago: Category was Panoramas. Winners were Greg Miller (digitals), Al Wollerton (color prints), George Sherrard (monochrome prints) and Carolyn Hawkins (novice); judge was Tom Barnett ... John Nation presented a program featuring his regional, national and international photography.



ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. Because of the pandemic, all classes (print and digital) must be entered digitally for monthly competitions through the end of 2021. No more than 2 entries allowed per category. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
