LPS HISTORY: THE MASTER BREWER

This month in LPS history

81 years ago: The club previewed a color movie it was producing to illustrate Louisville's smoke problem at its monthly meeting March 5 at the Watterson Hotel. The movie eventually was turned over to the city's smoke abatement committee and was shown in schools, clubs and public gatherings to illustrate the issue.

65 years ago: Elizabeth Richterkessing, wife of past president and LMC/LPS founder Frank Richterkessing, died of a heart attack March 18. She was 49. Elizabeth was LPS secretary in 1945-46. The monthly club meeting scheduled for March 20 was canceled.

40 years ago: Category was Water. Winners were Al Boice (slides), Murphy Brook (b/w prints) and Ethel Stoke (color prints) ... Bill Rhodes presented a competition slideshow, "Red River Gorge" ... LPS presented a "Spring Scenes" show March 14-21 at Bashford Manor Mall. 35 years ago: Category was Machinery. Winners were Glen Warren (slides), Jack Diehl (b/w prints) and Lynn Shea (color prints); judge was Jerry Spanyer ... Herman Wieck, a veteran photographer recently retired from Standard Gravure, presented a slideshow from his and his wife's trip to Hawaii. 30 years ago: Category was Closeups. Winner was Bob Wells (slides and color prints); no b/w print placewinners were awarded; judge was Bill Ogden ... (Continued on Page 5)

He was an original member of the Louisville Movie Club and served on the first seven boards of directors for LMC/LPS, spending 1944 as its movie vice president and 1945-46 on the social activities committee, arranging hotel rooms for salon judges and traveling speakers, and remaining an active member until his passing in 1953.

But J. (John) Carl Finger was best known for the brewing business, as the master brewer for the Frank Fehr Brewing Company, Louisville's largest and one of the most popular in the region. Finger had a hand in creating and/ or refining all of Fehr's 12 brands after it reopened in 1933 following the repeal of Prohibition. He'd become a brewmaster in 1912, at age 25, but had to switch careers in 1919 with the ratification of the 18th Amendment. So he became a realtor for 14 years. And then guided Fehr's Brewing (its slogan: "It's always Fehr weather") for 20 years, during which it became one of the 10 biggest breweries in the

country. The plant was located at 412 Fehr Ave. (now East Liberty between Preston and Jackson) and employed 300 people at its height. He developed Fehr's first holiday brew, Fehr's Cheer, and refined the formula for Fehr's Common, a non-lager beer with different yeast, no syrups/sugars and a creamier foam. He also was

responsible for the maintenance of Fehr's giant oak casks. Fehr's X.L. (Excellent Lager) was the topselling beer in Kentucky and

Indiana in the late 1940s and early 1950s. Coming from a brewing family (his father, brother and grandfather),

Finger's favorite hobby was making movies. It was his idea to film his nephew and budding professional boxer, Ernie Finger, in hopes of ironing out his flaws. It helped the 6-foot, 215-pounder from the University of Louisville enjoy a brief career, going 7-2 with 5 knockouts in a year. The next year, Finger jumped at the chance to join the brand-new LMC. Besides his board activities, he and his wife, Elsa, hosted several photo outings at his summer residence at Transylvania Beach off Upper River Road in Prospect (nowadays almost directly under the Lewis and

Clark Bridge).

Finger retired from Fehr's at the start of 1953 and died on Nov. 1 of that year. The brewery fell on hard times financially and closed for good in 1964; to avoid taxes, it dumped 7,600 barrels of beer down the drain. Interestingly, you still can buy Fehr's X.L. in Louisville; it's now being made by Akasha Brewing Co. on East Market Street.

CATEGORY EXPLANATIONS

Category explanations and restrictions for monthly competitions:

Bottles should include more than one bottle; **A Pair of Things** should include two matching or related items; **Bokeh** is the blurred quality or effect seen in the out-of-focus portion of a photograph taken with a narrow depth of field; **Uniforms** must include at least one person. **Things in Motion** will be reviewed to determine how the category can be better defined. An overall reminder is that the topic of the category should be the main focus of the photograph.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- \cdot You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
