To submit your single image for the Bernheim Gallery show:

Email it in JPEG format to kevin@louisvillephotographic.org no later than Sunday, Oct. 30.

Include your name, title, address, phone number and email address. That's so the library can print title cards for all of the prints and so all photographs are returned to the correct person.

The library will perform the installation of the exhibit, framing and hanging the images. It has frames in three sizes:

15 X 20

20 x 30

24 x 36

These are matted sizes and not image sizes. You must designate your first and second choice for the matted size when you submit your image. We soon will know the number of frames of each size. Your matted image must fit one of these sizes.

Once size is confirmed you will need to print and mat your image to that size and bring it to Kevin Laundroche at the November meeting, again with your name, title, address, phone number and email address.

There will be an opening reception for the exhibition on a date yet to be determined, and more information will be forthcoming as details are finalized.

This month in LPS history

80 years ago: The monthly meeting Oct. 22 was held in the Colonels Room of the Kentucky Hotel and featured the showing of two 16mm color sound films — "Warning," showing air raids in England, and another of details of the US Navy's fleet of ships ... Club members involved in the making of the local civil defense film also met Oct. 28 at City Hall to take test shots in advance of actual filming.

75 years ago: The monthly meeting Oct. 22 at the Watterson Hotel featured a demonstration of photographing, developing and projecting in the movie process. ... Print category was Boats. ... Membership as of this meeting was 121, including 42 spouses.

65 years ago: The monthly meeting Oct. 16 at Fincastle Community Center was a color slideshow of wildflowers in Kentucky and the Appalachians by Sylvester L. Brown, an engineer with the Army Corps of Engineers in Louisville.

40 years ago: Category was Points Beyond Kentucky. Winners were Marge Griffin (slides), Jim Pigram (color prints) and Alan Shadburne (b/w prints) ... The presentation was "Around the World," a slideshow exhibition of prints from the Kentucky Society of Natural History salon.


35 years ago: Categories were Nature Scenes and Children, owing to a mixup as to what the category was in September. Winners: for Nature Scenes, Julian Sacksteder (slides and color prints; no b/w entries); for Children, Al Boice (slides), Hawes Fisher (b/w prints) and Lynn Shea (color prints); judge was Judge Michael Brohm ... Program was a 15-minute slideshow of LPS member slides used in the annual publication of the Nature and Conservation Center, and "A Day of Nature in Kentuckiana," a 20-minute slideshow of winners of the annual Kentucky Society of Natural History photo contest ...

LPS HISTORY: JOE KINBERGER

Since its inception, LPS has had close ties to local camera shops. Robert Schuhmann, who started Schuhmann's Click Clinic downtown in 1946, was a member and board member through the 1940s and 1950s. Frank Von Allmen, who headed the first Salon in 1944 and was a board member through the 40s, worked for Schuhmann. These days, LPS maintains sponsor relationships with Murphy's, Outdoor Photo Gear, Unique Imaging and Kinetic, and has connections with many other shops.

Perhaps the most colorful of those in the early days was Joe Kinberger, who ran two downtown photo shops from 1955-72 and kept their names in the public eye with loads of newspaper advertising.

Kinberger also was a charter member of the Louisville Movie Club in 1941, was secretary on LPS' first board in 1944 and club president in 1950. He served various years on the LPS board through the mid 1960s, and with his wife, Evelyn, was a part of the

LPS Auxiliary that showed club movies to hospital patients in the early 1960s.

He first made his name during World War II as the Jefferson County chairman of the Kentucky Petroleum Industry Scrap Rubber Committee, helping collect more than a million pounds of scrap rubber. But before that, he won local bait-casting tournaments and was one of the city's better

Winners were Kathleen Baker (color prints), David Becker (b/w prints), Hans Young (slides), Eric Link (digital) and Becky Wright

Weekend (Oct. 26-28 at Pine Mountain).

10 years ago: Category was In Flight. Winners were George Sherrard (digitals), Ken Tripp (color prints), Al Wollerton (b/w prints) and Sherry Pickerell (novice); judge was Rick Lombardo ... Program was a talk by Studio Nulu owner Nathan Lynch about the benefits of studio rental for photographers ... The 50th Photoscenic Weekend was held Oct. 12-14 at Cumberland Falls State Park and featured speaker Sam Abell from National Geographic.

(novice); judge was Jason Holzworth ... Program was a member discussion of depth of field, led by Eric Link ... Marshall Johnson swept closeups, scenic and best of show at the 45th Photoscenic

Five years ago: Category was Insects. Winners were Christine Hayden (digitals), David Kelm (color prints), Kenneth Applegate (mono prints) and Anita Doster (novice); judge was Tim Easley ... speaker was renowned local photographer Bud Dorsey sharing his favorite images from his new book, "Available Light" ... Fred Waits won Best in Show and "The Lake" category at Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 13-14 at Lake Cumberland).

LPS HISTORY: JOE KINBERGER

amateur golfers in the 1930s. He was very active with the Kosair Shriners and often dressed as a clown for young patients. And then he ran LPS in 1950, the one year without a Salon between 1944-58 as the club moved from a fall date in 1949 to a spring one in 1951. Finally Joe went into the camera business, opening the Kentucky Camera Shop in a tiny space (6 by 9 feet) at 651 S. Fourth (now CC's Kitchen at the Marketplace) in the summer of 1955. But business boomed, and by the fall of 1957, he moved down and across the street to a 12 by 55 foot store at 676 S. Fourth (across the street from the Brown Hotel). The store had a complete selection of Leica cameras but also Kodak, and loads of accessories. It did its own processing (a 20-exposure

roll of color Kodachrome for \$1.60 in 1959). In October 1964, he moved back across the street to open Joe's Camera Nook inside the lobby of the Brown Hotel. The "nook" was almost as big as his previous shop, and featured novelty items as well as camera equipment, like a musical Santa that hung on the door and played "Jingle Bells" with the pull of a cord (\$2.95). Or a transistor radio that looked like a Victrola. Plus humorous greeting cards. memo pads and slogan cards. The store closed in 1972, and Kinberger settled into retirement in the east end. His wife, Evelyn, died in 1986. He died at age 89 in January 1997 and interestingly, was survived by his mother, Florence. She died six weeks later. She was 112.

70 YEARS AGO (OCT. 7, 1952)

LPS sponsored a talk Oct. 7 in the Speed Scientific School auditorium by Dr. Francis C.K. Wu of Hong Kong on how photography is practiced by the Chinese, tracing the influence of traditional Chinese art on his photography, which featured landscapes and character studies and had to that point won numerous international awards. In 1953, he was the world's third most exhibited photographer, counting salons and gallery shows. He ran the preeminent photo studio in Hong Kong, which performed all kinds of work - portrait, industrial, fashion, aerial and journalistic. He was brought to the US through the efforts of the Photographic Society of America

and the Photographers' Association and also gave talks in New York and Chicago.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.

DIRECTIONS TO ST. LUKE'S

LPS meetings have moved to St. Luke's Episcopal Church at 1206 Maple Lane in Anchorage (the red dot on map at right). From the Gene Snyder, take exit 30 (LaGrange Road), turn left from the ramp and go 2 miles, then turn right onto Ridge Road. In 0.4 miles you'll reach Evergreen Road (the main street of Anchorage). 
