This month in LPS history

80 years ago: The Louisville Movie Club staged a simulated air raid Jan. 24 at the being-demolished old post office, complete with wardens, emergency medical units and victims, to be part of a civil defense film it's making for the Louisville Defense Council (see full story in October 2020 newsletter). **66 years ago:** Meetings move from Sheraton-Seelbach to Fincastle Community Building; Jan. 23 program included a color film on the British West Indies by J.E. Payton, and a series of slides on "Elements of Color Composition."

43 years ago: Vincent Hensley, a retired toolmaker at the GE Appliance Park who was president in 1961 and a longtime LPS member, died Jan. 11 at age 64. In the fall of 1984, his widow, Dorothy, created a fund in his name to rename the Kentucky State Fair's award for best monochrome photo. But she passed away in July 1985, a month before the first Hensley Award was presented to Willi Koesters.

40 years ago: Category was Machinery. Winners were Harold Rea (slides), Bob Dentinger (b/w prints) and Ethel Stoke (color prints) ... Program was "Life in China," a slideshow of Ethel Stoke's recent trip ... Dues (\$12) were due ... LPS had a show at the Louisville School of Art's Gallery in the Mall (St. Matthews) from Jan. 3-31.

35 years ago: Category was Windows (regular) and Santa Claus

2022 NECROLOGY

Several prominent photographers passed away last year. Here is a selection:

DOUGLAS KIRKLAND // The biggest stars



Douglas Kirkland photographing Marilyn Monroe in 1961. "I had everything technically right," he later recalled, "but it was Marilyn Monroe who really created these images." (Douglas Kirkland)

Kirkland, whose subjects included Marilyn Monroe wrapped in a silk sheet and Coco Chanel at work in Paris, died Oct. 2. He was 88. He was welcomed into the homes of stars like Elizabeth Taylor, Sophia Loren and Ann-Margret. He "had this magical quality," said Karen Mullarkey, photo director at New York and Newsweek.

STEVE SCHAPIRO // Chronicling America

Schapiro, recognized for photo essays that illuminated cultural and political shifts in the country, and later for celebrity portraits, died Jan. 16 of pancreatic cancer. He was 87. His essays covered a wide spectrum of themes, like the Civil Rights Movement, Robert F. Kennedy's presidential campaign, migrant workers in Arkansas, hippies in Haight-Asbury, Easter celebrations in Harlem, and others. He later photographed album covers and support shots for major Hollywood films.

RON GALELLA // King of the paparazzi

Galella, one of the country's most renowned photographers, who helped shape the modern cult of celebrity with his candid, unposed images of such figures as Elizabeth Taylor, Mick Jagger and Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, died April 30. He was 91. He didn't work from a studio, instead shooting from the sidewalk and became the country's most notorious celebrity photographer. "He is a viper, a parasite, a stalker, a vermin," critic Roger Ebert wrote. "He is also, I have decided, a national treasure."

Winners were Marshall Johnson (color prints) and T.Y. Huang (slides, b/w prints); judge was Chad Heule ... Program was a slideshow, "Lighthouses of the Great Lakes," by Danny Dempster ... Dues (\$30) were due. 15 years ago: Category was Scenic. Winners were Kay Sherrard (color prints), Parveen Qureshi (b/w prints), Gertrude Hudson (slides), David Becker (digital) and Beverly Gottfried (novice); judges were Larry Spitzer (prints), and Al Boice and Kathleen Baker (digitals, slides) ... Program was a review of favorite member images with tips included by Danny Dempster ... Longtime member Gerald Weber published a book about his personal experiences in World War II, with more than 300 photos. 10 years ago: Category was Scenic. Winners were Greg Miller (digitals), Al Wollerton (color prints), John Holthaus (monochrome prints) and Sherry Pickerell (novice); judge was John Snell ... Program was a slideshow and talk by member Ken Tripp, "Time, Place and Travel," about finding local venues to photograph ... Alphabet slideshow winner was Kay Sherrard, "LPS Categories Through the Years." ... Al Boice won the Episcopal Church's Cornerstone Award for service to the church community and also was awarded a lifetime LPS membership. Five years ago: Category was Scenic. Advanced winners were John Holthaus (digitals), Al Wollerton (color prints) and David Kelm (mono prints); amateur winners were Carolyn Hawkins (digitals), Natia Kelm (color prints) and Jim Ofcacek (mono prints); judge was Chris Klapheke ... The Louisville Drone Pilots presented a program on attaching cameras to drones for aerial photography.

TIM PAGE // A Vietnam legend

Page, who built a reputation as one of the Vietnam War's most renowned and fearless photojournalists, died Aug. 24. He was 78. Arriving in Vietnam in 1965 at 20, the British-born Page rode his motorcycle to the front lines and climbed aboard helicopters to take photographs that showed the dust flying beneath the rotors, the desolation of dispossessed Vietnamese villagers, the gurneys laden with fallen soldiers. He was wounded four times. His pictures were featured in Life magazine, Time, Paris Match and other journals. When he returned from the battlefield, his house in old Saigon (now Ho Chi Minh City) was the headquarters for

nonstop parties, fueled by huge amounts of marijuana, LSD and opium, as rock albums blared at high volume. Page was, in large part, the inspiration for the drugged-out, risk-taking war photographer played by Dennis Hopper in Francis Ford Coppola's 1979 Vietnam War film, "Apocalypse Now."

DIRCK HALSTEAD // History's storyteller

Halstead, who first made his name over a decade covering the Vietnam War from escalation to the fall of Saigon, died March 25. He was 85. In 29 years as a Time magazine contract photographer assigned to the White House, he shot 47 covers. When the Clinton-Lewinsky scandal broke, Halstead found an old image on film that became one of the scandal's signature images. "It was an extraordinarily lucky moment," Halstead said.

TONY VACCARO // War from the soldier's view

Vaccaro, whose close-up photos from his 272 days in combat from Normandy to Germany during World War II caused a sensation, died Dec. 28. He was 100. Later he became a fashion and celebrity magazine photographer. He was one of the few to get candid shots of artist Georgia O'Keeffe.







ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
