

This month in LPS history

82 years ago: The Louisville Movie Club held its first meeting Feb. 5 at the Watterson Hotel. The \$1 ticket included dinner, films and entertainment. Annual dues were set at \$3 for individuals, \$5 for a family. Courier-Journal photographer Harold Rhodenbaugh was named the first president. It was the first allcolor amateur movie club in the nation. 50 years ago: Bill Rhodes won year-end awards for best movie and best color slide at the annual banquet Feb. 24 at the Holiday Inn on Brownsboro Road. Other first-place winners: Robert Wallace (b/w prints) and Irving McElroy (color slide travelogue). Marge Griffin won the community service award. 45 years ago: LMC charter member and former LPS board member and officer Eddie Raible died. He was 70.


40 years ago: Category was Table Top. Winners were Paul Roberts (slides), B.G. Ash (b/w prints) and Menta DeLeuil (color prints) ... Program Feb. 9 was an open Q&A with Ray Murphy of Camera Center ... Banquet was Feb. 12 at Holiday Inn on Brownsboro Road with speaker Robert Owens, chief photographer for Scripps-Howard. discussing "Photography in the News."

35 years ago: Category was Statues. Winners were Lynn Shea (color prints), Ethel Stoke (slides) and Bob Guest (b/w prints); judges were Zana Naake and Jim Jeunesse ... Program was a slideshow by Don M. Olsson, "Things for the Photo Bag. Why. And the Results," including exhibits of equipment he used to take his nature photos.

30 years ago: Category was Emotions. Winners were Bob Wells (b/w prints), David Young (color prints) and Ethel Stoke (slides); judge was Leroy Anderson ... Program was a slide presentation of the LPS Showcase Slide Show presented at Bashford Manor Mall. 25 years ago: There was no competition, and the program combined an equipment swap/ trade/sale with member demonstrations (Greta Garbo/hand coloring, Jack Drake/ digital video, John Smithers/graduated neutral density filters, Bill Rhodes/E-6 film processing) ... The awards banquet was Feb. 21 at the Bardstown Road Holiday Inn with a nature-oriented slideshow by Adam Jones from his recent trip to Africa.

20 years ago: Category was Dereliction. Winners were Bob Dorzback (color and b/w prints) and Fred Engelmann (slides); judge was Mitch Eckert ... Program was a slideshow, "The Beauty of Nature," by member Marshall Johnson ... The awards banquet was Feb. 9 at Masterson's and featured Adam Jones and his

LPS HISTORY: BANQUETS

It could be said that the Louisville Movie Club got into the banquet business at the start — for the first year, monthly meetings featured a buffet supper before, usually for 50 cents or \$1. After February 1942, the suppers went away, but the annual February banquets continued — for the next 70 years. Most years that included a social hour followed by a full dinner of roast beef, fried chicken or similar, presentation of year-end awards and a speaker. In the 1940s and 1950s, they also included a sort of talent night; many members were musicians and one, Gus Brakmeier, was a professional magician. Cost was reasonable. In the 1940s, a ticket cost \$2 (except for \$1.75 in 1944). It

crept up but stayed in single digits through 1988, moving to locations all over the city. They started at the Seelbach (through 1946), Kunz's on Shelby and Burnett (late 40s), and visited a selection of other establishments — the Provincial House on Poplar Level Road, Mary's Italian Restaurant on Dixie Highway, the Brown Suburban Motel, the Bardstown Road Holiday Inn Continued on next page

— before settling at the Brownsboro Road Holiday Inn (mid-1970s, 1981-84). Then came 12 years at Kosair Temple (1985-97 except 1990 at Heitzman Bakery on Hikes Lane), three years at the Bardstown Road Holiday Inn (1998-2000), six at Masterson's (2001-06) and six at the Episcopal Church Home (2007-12).

In the 1980s, the preferred speakers were TV news and Courier-Journal photographers. By the late 1990s, the area's top photographers made presentations — Adam Jones, Mitch Eckert, Richard and Bert Wolf, John Nation, plus a bunch of C-J photographers and photo editors. And every five years starting in the 1960s, an anniversary was celebrated for the club that started Feb. 5, 1941.

They started out as dressy affairs, many members in formal wear; within a few years, required dress was jacket & tie for men, dresses for women. It stayed that way into the current century.

LPS has always had other get-togethers — picnics, pot lucks, field trips, etc. — which have continued, like last year's 80th anniversary celebration and a field trip to Bardstown, Ky. But, falling victim to rising costs and shrinking availability, the annual banquet is no more.



The **double exposure** category for June will actually be multiple exposures; entries are not limited to two exposures. Tom will cover how to do this in and out of camera at the March meeting.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
