BIENNIAL SHOW INSTRUCTIONS

To participate in the LPS Biennial show: + Submit one or two images (JPEG of any size) by **May 31** to Bob Dorzback (rdorzback@gmail.com).

+ The email should provide photographer name and title for each photo, and which is Photo #1 and which is Photo #2. It also should note whether an image is for sale and what you feel a fair price would be, and

whether the image has won any honor in a photo competition (i.e., LPS, Fair, etc.). The church will keep 25 percent of the funds from photographs sold during the show. + Members will be charged \$10 for each photo accepted for the show, which goes toward Biennial fees, the opening reception and show promotion. That will be collected at the **June 14** LPS meeting.

+ Accepted photos must be printed no larger than 16 x 20 (excluding frame) and no smaller than 8 x 10 (excluding frame).
+ Members are responsible for their own framing, and all photos should have a wire on the back for hanging. Any frame can be used, and any photo media is eligible: matte, glossy, canvas, metallic, etc.

+ On **Aug. 31 (5-8 pm)**, members deliver their photos to the church for hanging. A pizza party will follow.

+ On **Sept. 9 (1-4 pm)**, the opening reception will be held. + On **Sept. 30 (10-11:30 am)**, members need to take down their photos and bring them home. Members are invited to breakfast (on their own) at the First Watch restaurant at Holiday Manor.

BUY USED GEAR, GIVE TO LPS

At Wednesday's meeting, Jackie Mattingly and Paul Schmetzer will be setting up a table of used photo gear. Proceeds from any sale will help benefit LPS.

There are two professional quality 35mm film cameras with auto film drives and one standard film 35mm camera; an assortment of lenses that go with the camera or any Nikon "F" mount system; two strobes, strobe stands, power cords, and lens hoods.

The gear will be available for donations of \$10, \$15, or \$20 for the big items and \$5 for small items. Checks should be made out to LPS; cash is OK, too.

LPS HISTORY: FILMING THE DERBY (ALMOST)

With this year's race fresh in everyone's mind, it seems a good time to revisit LPS' piece of Kentucky Derby history (much of this first appeared in the April 2020 newsletter). Some of you may know that the Derby was first televised in 1949, by WAVE-TV in Louisville. It was aired live in Louisville and sent to NBC as a kinescope newsreel recording for national broadcast. But that wasn't the first planned Derby telecast, which was to be done by LPS in 1946!

LPS President Frank Richterkessing had been thinking about trying to film a Derby for a few years, and sold CBS' television director, John Sewall, on the idea. The plan was for Sewall to come out the day before the race with a New York male actor to handle the voice-over and a model from the renowned Powers agency to display the fashions. On race day, three other LPS members, Eddie Raible, Carl Finger and Vernon Fields, were to be placed strategically around the track to film the Derby. Fields was the most experienced sports cameraman — the Manual alum filmed the Manual-Male football game each year

70 years ago: The 9th annual Louisville International Salon of Photography was held April 21-May 9, with slide viewing (202 of 902 submitted) at the downtown library and print viewing (127 of 644 submitted) at Refrigeration Sales, 800 S. Brook.

40 years ago: Category was Creative Photography. Winners were Don Sivori (slides), Alan Shadburne (b/w prints) and Lila Worth (color prints) ... Program was "Camera Clubs in the Community," about LPS' history and standing in the Louisville area, by Frank

Richterkessing, the past president and last living charter member of LPS ... The club had a field trip May 22 to Camp Merry Ledges (near Depauw, IN; now an event venue). **35 years ago:** Category was Farm Animals. Winners were Al Boice (slides) and Ed Howard (color prints); judge was Lee Roy Anderson ... Program was a slideshow by five of the top slide winners in 1987 LPS competitions ... LPS members swept the top three places in the Kentucky Society of Natural History's "A Day of Nature in Kentuckiana" photo contest May 14 and 21 at Joe Creason Park – Dale Weir (first), Ethel Stoke (second) and Helen Cox (third). **30 years ago:** Category was Speed. Winners were Bob Wells (color and b/w prints) and Bill Clark (slides); judge was Alan Shadburne ... Program did not appear in the newsletter. **25 years ago:** Category was Clouds. Winners were Gertrude Hudson (slides), Greta Garbo

for team and alumni gatherings; he also had started filming the state basketball tournament. Raible and Finger had played key roles in past projects, notably the simulated air raid response on Louisville in 1943. Richterkessing would shoot the home stretch with two cameras mounted side by side on a tripod "just in case one of them goes bad," he told the Courier-Journal.

The resulting film would be rushed to New York by chartered plane immediately after the race, where it would be processed to a 15-minute length and televised at 6 p.m. Sunday by WCBW, the CBS station in New York. It wouldn't be seen in Louisville because the city didn't have a station yet.

But it never happened. Early in Derby week the union for newsreel and photo-finish cameramen got wind of the arrangement, made without their consent, and threatened to strike and boycott the Derby if CBS filmed it without using union cameramen. The protest against CBS had stemmed from an earlier squabble over televising the early conferences of the United Nations in New York City. Richterkessing offered to add two union cameramen, but this was rejected. Richterkessing had no choice but to acquiesce, and the plan came to naught. Three years later it was worked out for WAVE to show the race, and finally in 1952 CBS got to show the Derby live on a national telecast originated by WHAS-TV.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- \cdot You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
