BIENNIAL/ SHOW NEWS, UPDATES



Shows of note:

@"Unexpected," which features dynamic abstracts created from images of commercial trash dumpsters, by our newest member, Mark Lee Webb, runs through Oct. 29 at the Pigment Gallery in the Mellwood Art Center.

@"7 x 7," featuring seven photos from each of seven photographers with LPS ties — Tom Barnett, David Becker, Robert Klein, Kevin Laundroche, Nick Roberts, Ken Tripp and Jerry Wolff — runs through Nov. 12 in the Bernheim Gallery in the main branch of the Louisville Free Public Library.

@"Purpose and Repurpose," combining the nature/landscape work of Kimara Wilhite and the silver photography of past LPS member Fred DiGiovanni, runs through Nov. 10 at the Bourne-Schweitzer Gallery, 137 E. Main St. in New Albany. An artist reception is Oct. 28 from 2-5 pm, with a gallery talk from 3-4.

@There will be a pinhole photography workshop Oct. 28 from 9 am-1 pm at Bellarmine University in Room 103 of the Norton Art Building. Cost is \$20, and it includes a brief lecture followed by a demonstration on how to make a pinhole camera. Those cameras will be taken outside and used, and paper negatives processed in the darkroom. LPS ALL PEOPLES SHOW

LPS' one group Biennial show ran Sept. 1-30 at All Peoples Church off Brownsboro Road near Holiday Manor. A total of 30 members contributed 58 prints (and paid \$10 per print to defray the cost of the reception and rental of the space). The images filled the Roberta Marx Gallery, which includes the front foyer and entry hallway. Many members attended the official opening on Sept. 8 and staffed the exhibit every day of the run.

This month in LPS history

75 years ago: The fifth Louisville International Salon of Photography was presented Oct. 1-17, with prints exhibited at the Speed Museum and, for the first time, color slides shown Oct. 7, 12 and 14 at the auditorium inside the Speed Scientific School. A total of 171 contributors submitted 661 prints, with 11 foreign countries represented; the jury chose 182 prints from 99 entrants; 158 entrants submitted 628 color slides, and 244 were chosen from 111 contributors. ... At the monthly meeting Oct. 13 at 936 S. Fifth, Frank Richterkessing discussed "Exposure and Development." 50 years ago: The Patio Room of the Jewish Community Center hosted a seasonend show of LPS (September to June), with a reception that opened Oct. 7. 40 years ago: Category was Water Scenes. Winners were Paul Roberts (slides), Alan Shadburne (b/w prints) and L.E. Sanborn (color prints); judge was Carl Maupin ... Program was "The World of Nature," a slideshow of the winners in the Kentucky Society of Natural History's Nature Salon, presented by Al Boice. 35 years ago: Category was Hot Air

35 years ago: Category was Hot Air Balloons. Winners were Helen Cox (slides) and Pat Zimmerman (color prints); no b/w prints were entered; judge was Steve Hartman ... Program was a slideshow by

LPS HISTORY: ERNEST HUMPHREY



Ernest Humphrey received a medal from then-former LPS president Frank Richterkessing in 1956 for service to the club. By then he had been print chairman for the salon five years running and a board member for eight. (Courier-Journal Photo)

Ernest Humphrey was a World War I veteran who went on to a long career heading the U.S. government's Alcohol Tax Unit and as an American Legion co-founder and commander of Iroquois Post 229 in south Louisville. He spearheaded the rebuilding of the post headquarters at Woodlawn and Bellevue (it since has moved to St. Andrews Church Road, near Iroquois Park). In 1937, he housed people displaced by the flood. He was a photographer and stamp collector and showed movies at local hospitals to entertain patients. He joined LPS in 1946 and hit the deck running, joining the salon

committee the next spring and being elected to the board of directors in 1948, when he was named vice president of movies. In his five years as print salon chair, the print judges screened an average of 800 photos and accepted 200. In 1952, he told The Courier-Journal that the basic requirements for a successful salon picture are story-telling qualities, composition and print technique, the first two "art" and the third "science."

Humphrey's last year on the salon committee was 1956, ending a nine-year run. But he maintained his membership and his Legion activities until his death in 1967.

LPS HISTORY: CAPT. VERNON FIELDS

You could say Capt. B. Vernon Fields was pushing the envelope all of his adult life. Besides being an envelope salesman by day, Fields, who served in World War I (like Ernest Humphrey, page 4) and was a retired Army captain, was at the forefront of most of the Louisville Movie Club/Photographic Society movie projects in the 1940s, including the civil defense film and the aborted Kentucky Derby venture in 1946. He was the lead movie board member in 1946-47 and a proponent of the "Magic-Eye" camera invented in the 1940s to record the finish of horse races.

For years he shot film of the Male-Manual football game, then played on Thanksgiving

Gerald Weber of his trip to Germany ... Hawes Fisher won the St. Matthews Indian Summer photo contest; Danny Dempster was second and Bill Clark third ... At Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 21-23 at Jenny Wiley State Park), Gertrude Hudson won the grand prize; Julian Sacksteder was first in scenic and Gordon Griffes first in close up.

30 years ago: Category was Windows, Portals and Doors. Winners were Jim Bryan (slides) and Bob Wells (color prints, b/w prints); judge was Larry Spitzer ... Program was a slideshow, "Islands of the Sea Birds," by Bob Wells, taken in Nova Scotia ... At Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 22-24 at Pine Mountain State Park), Alan Caudill won best of show; Larry Foster took first in scenics and closeups. 25 years ago: Category was Hands. Winners were Bill Rhodes (slides), Sandy Nabb (color prints) and Jenni Goossens (b/w prints): judge was Jerry Spanyer ... Program was a presentation on portrait photography by highly regarded, longtime professional Don Morgan ... Quite a few members traveled to see the civil war encampment at Perryville on Oct. 10 ... The Speed Museum hosted an Ansel Adams show Sept. 22-Nov. 15 ... At Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 23-25 at Carter Caves State Park), John Smithers won Best of Show; Gertrude Hudson was first in scenics, Babs Brant first in closeups.

20 years ago: Category was Rural Life. Winners were Deborah Brownstein (color prints), Byron Butler (b/w prints) and Fred Engelmann (slides); judge was Randy West ... Program was a presentation, "Talking with the Animals," by Bill

Day, and showed the footage both to Manual alums (he was class of 1913) and LPS. He then expanded to basketball, becoming the first to film the state tournament in 1946, then at the Louisville Armory. Unfortunately, too much smoke in the arena dulled his quality. But he tried again and was so successful that the KHSAA rented the one-hour film to schools for viewing. He continued his filming through the 1950s and died in 1969 at age 76. You might also say that Fields' vocation had come naturally; his father, J.J. Fields, was superintendent of mail at the Louisville post office for 40 years.

Thomas, about growing up at Oakbrook Farm, how to locate animals and how to act when you encounter them ... At Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 17-19 at Greenbo State Park), Marshall Johnson won best of show and scenics; Gertrude Hudson was first in closeups ... Omni Imaging & Photographic Supply on East Jefferson, a longtime LPS sponsor, closed for good on Oct. 31.

15 years ago: Category was Sports. Winners were Al Wollerton (color prints), David Becker (monochrome prints and digital), Fred Engelmann (slides) and Jozsef Szilagyi (novice); judge was George Thompson ... The program was "Archiving and Your Photographs," presented by Bill Carner of the University of Louisville Archives ... David Becker won best of show and first in scenic and closeups at Photoscenic Weekend (Oct. 17-18 at Cumberland State Resort Park) ... Photos by Al Wollerton and Bob Wells were featured in the 2008 National Geographic photo contest.

10 years ago: Category was Wildlife (no birds). Winners were Greg Miller (digitals), David Becker (color and monochrome prints) and Gordi Smith (novice); judge was Joey Goldsmith ... Program was "Getting the Most from Your Flash," by John Adkins. **Five years ago:** Category was Human Condition. Advanced winners were Kelly Davenport (digitals), Ted Heitzman (color prints) and Deborah Brownstein (monochrome prints); amateur winners were Leigh Ann Logsdon (digitals and color prints) and B.J. Sorenson (monochrome prints); judges were Ken Tripp and Kevin Laundroche ... Program was a presentation on the use of Artificial Intelligence in photography by Greg Miller.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.




