APRIL PROGRAM: LEE PENNINGTON

Wednesday, April 10, 7 pm at St. Luke's Church

Retired college professor Lee Pennington will give a presentation about his career in documentary video — he's produced 26 over the past 30 years through JoLe Productions, started in 1990 with his late wife, Joy: "(We) began making cultural video documentaries from around the world. I have visited all 7 continents and 96 foreign countries and have taken pictures in all of them."

Pennington also is the author of 23 books, mostly poetry — three of which have been nominated for the Pulitzer Prize. He has given poetry readings and workshops around the

world. An avid researcher, he has published hundreds of articles in over 300 magazines in America and abroad. Nine of his plays have been produced. Before his foray into video, he took "thousands of rolls of film" with an M-3 Leica loaned to him by noted author and educator Jesse Stuart (who was principal when Pennington attended McKell High School). In 2013 the University of Louisville honored him and his late wife by opening the Lee and Joy Pennington Cultural Heritage Gallery, a wing in the Ekstrom Library. Most recently, a documentary about him called "The Story of the Story Behind the Story of Lee Pennington" was runner-up at the Imaginarium Film Festival.

WHAT ARE ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES?

The subject for our May monthly photo competition is "Close-up of an Architectural Feature". So what is an architectural feature? An architectural feature is a prominent or characteristic part of a building. Examples of architectural features are windows, columns, awnings, marquee and fascia, something that helps define the style of the architecture of the building. What makes it "Modern", "Gothic" or "Victorian"? The May competition calls for a close-up photo of architectural features, rather than a complete view of the building. So grab your camera and photograph a closeup of the feature you want to highlight.

The rules largely haven't changed. but those desiring tags before drop-off day will be able to make an appointment starting July 25 to get them early. Regular entry deadline will be July 10; the late entry deadline will be July 17.

This month in LPS history

83 years ago: Harold Rhodenbaugh was elected the first president of the recently organized Louisville Movie Club at its monthly meeting April 2. Other officers chosen were first vice president R.L. McGuire, second vice president Frank Richterkessing, and secretary/treasurer Marjorie Moore ... The club's movie on Louisville's smoke problem was made available for public showing at mid-month. 80 years ago: The monthly meeting April 20 in the Leather Room of the Seelbach Hotel was attended by 29 members and 14 guests and included an 8mm Kodachrome movie, "Three Wishes," obtained from Home Movies Magazine; a 30-minute discussion of the special photographic effects in that movie; and exhibition of photo prints for the April assignment, "Landscapes"; Dr. G. Halsey Hunt's prints, "Weathered" and "Lake Tahoe," were judged first- and second-best, respectively. ... At the monthly board meeting April 14, the club's bank balance was reported at \$125.10 ... E. Earl Curtis of Paducah, KY and Rowena Fruth of xxx signed on as judges for the first international salon to take place in June ... The board agreed to extend complimentary one-year memberships to all LPS members in the Armed Forces.

70 years ago: The 10th Louisville International Salon of Photography was shown in late April and early May (see article at right).

69 years ago: Movies were added to the annual salon for the first time and 13 films were submitted and judged.

64 years ago: The monthly meeting featured a 20-minute film on the life of American pioneer military photographer Mathew Brady.

53 years ago: LPS had a member show of 60 prints, color and black and white, at the Center for Photographic Studies in the Galt House.

40 years ago: Category was Humor. Winners were Hawes Fisher (slides), Dee Witouski (b/w prints) and Ethel Stoke (color prints); judge was Jim Ouellette ... C-J photographer Billy Davis presented "Wildflower Photography."


35 years ago: Category was Landscapes (no buildings). Winners were Marge Griffin (slides), Ron Lehocky (color prints) and Menta DeLeuil (b/w prints); judge was Billy

LPS HISTORY: THE 10TH SALON



One of the 196 accepted prints was "The River Sarthe at St. Marceau" by Jean Bienaime of LeMans, France; it was made from a wet carbon process and was one of more than 100 submissions from 21 foreign countries, a salon record. The 938 print and 1.084 color slide entries also set records. (Courier-Journal, 4-25-54)

In just 10 years, the Louisvile International Salon of Photography had grown from a small experiment to one of the top exhibitions of its kind in the country. There had been about 500 print entries in 1944, its first year; for the 10th, there were 938 print entries and 1,084 color slides submitted, both records. Of those, 196 prints were chosen to be hung in the lobby of the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times building. That location was a first, but it cemented the relationship between LPS and The C-J, which displayed prints through the last salon in 1958. A total of 228 slides were picked to be presented in a show running two nights at the downtown



public library. Slide entry numbers overtook print entries for good in 1952. That mirrored the national trend — 1953 was the first year that color photo supplies outsold monochrome nationally. The 1954 salon program was the first with a photo on its cover, "Ski Run

LPS HISTORY: THE 10TH SALON

Tampers" by Freeman F. Wallin of Albany, NY. The salon chair, Eugene Worth, was in his first of two years at the helm. He was a plant engineer at Philip Morris and soon to be president of the local plant engineers society. But interestingly his wife, Lila, was the more accomplished photographer, routinely winning LPS and other contests, and more prominent as the director of the local chapter of the Girl Scouts.

The prints chair was Ernest Humphrey, a federal alcohol tax collector and commander of a local American Legion post; the slides chair was elementary school teacher Catharine Wiley, a longtime LPS officer, board member and top photographer.

LPS co-founder Frank Richterkessing was Society president again in 1954 (and would be once more in 1959) after six previous years at the helm. That year, after years in various downtown hotels, the monthly meetings were held on the third Wednesday of each month in a huge conference room inside Eddie Daub's grocery store at 936 S. Fifth St.

The 1954 salon had one more milestone — the end of the \$1 entry fee per entrant (up to four slides,

up to four prints). In 1955, it went to \$2. That's because every print and slide submitted was mailed back to its entrant — and the rapid rise of foreign entries taxed the salon's budget considerably. In 1956, slides dropped back to \$1.25 and prints stayed \$2. Movies, which were added in 1956, were \$1-5 per entry depending on length.

30 years ago: Category was Nature. Winners were Babs Brant (slides), Sandy Nabb (color prints) and Beverly Ballantine (b/w prints); judge was Cliff Wallace ...Program was a slideshow, "Environmental Portraits," by Alan Horrar of Whittenberg's ... Eighteen members volunteered to photograph the March of Diumes Walk-A-Thon April 16 at the Bowman Field Driver's License office.

25 years ago: Category was Windows. Winners were Lynn Shea (color prints), Bob Dorzback (b/w prints) and Bill Rhodes (slides); judges were Ralph Sidway and Luis Martens ... Program was not in the newsletter ... A few LPS members went on a wildflower walk in Bernheim Forest with retired University of Louisville botany professor Varley Wiedeman.

20 years ago: Category was Reflections. Winners were

T.Y. Huang (slides and b/w prints) and Rick Sherry (color prints); judge was Larry Spitzer ... Program was Spitzer's judging of the monthly contest.

15 years ago: Category was Still Life. Winners were Bob Wells (monochrome and color prints), Doris McDowell (slides), Tammy Shaw (digitals) and Linda Martin (novice); judge was James Calvert ... Program was a presentation by Kay Sherrard on fixing digital snapshots and how to covert a PowerPoint slide to an editable photo.

10 years ago: Category was Patterns. Winners were Stephanie Turner (digitals), Gordi Smith (color prints), Kenny Pritchett (monochrome prints) and Eileen Strenecky (novice); judge was Sam Moseley... April 2014 newsletter was not available.

Five years ago: Category was Glass. Advanced winners were Greg Miller (digitals), Kay Sherrard (color prints) and Nick Roberts (monochrome prints); amateur winners were Jack Cooney (digitals) and Kyle Shepherd (color and monochrome prints); judge was Peggy Harms ... Program was a slideshow of commercial photography by Dan Dry.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.






